Whichever resort you visit in Italy there are so many exciting hidden treasures for you to find from the worlds greatest cities to preserved ancient ruins. Hundreds of places off the beaten track await the adventurous traveller in search of a more selftailored holiday.

Great spots to visit in an Avis car...

- Driving from Lake Garda to Verona gives you a chance to see the beautiful countryside as well as an amazing city. Known as piccola Roma for its importance in the imperial days of the 13th and 14th centuries, this period is noted for the savage family feuding of which Shakespeare wrote in his play, Romeo and Juliette.
- Not to be missed but often overlooked is Treviso; close to Lido di Jesolo and boasts a likeness to Venice. It's cathedral holds frescoes by II Pordenone (1484-1539) and can be found by following the medieval main street to the piazza del duomo. If shopping is your thing then you'll be pleased to know that Luciano Benetton is Trevisio's favourite son.
- The Adriatic Riviera is famous for its long sandy beaches but the area is surrounded by picturesque villages only accessible by car such as Veruccio, Santarcangelo and San Leo.
- The roads around Sicily are easily navigated and there are literally hundreds of off-the-beaten-track places to see. In Tindari on the north coast you will find the ruins of ancient Tyndaris, a Greek settlement, with unparalleled views over the Oliveri lagoon, founded on a rocky promontory in 396BC.
- Every turn tells a different story as you drive along the valle del dragone passes through the • soaring mountains and deep ravines from Sorrento to beautiful Ravello. Former playground of Jackie Kennedy, Ravello sits like a natural balcony overhanging Amalfi and the near by towns of Minori and Maiori. Seek out the breathtaking views that this coastline has to offer.
- Explore the beauty of the Mediterranean's second largest island, Sardinia. Getting off the beaten track with a hire car enables you to discover deserted sandy beaches, the forest of Mount Ferru or the vineyards of Campidano.

Places to note ...

Sicily

Be sure to make a visit to **Mount Etna**, the largest volcano in Europe and one of the most active in the world.

Verona

Arena di Verona - a 2000 year old Roman Arena and it's still going strong. The opera stage is the largest in the world. In the summer months the arena hosts opera and other performances.

Tarormina

Pay a visit to **Teatro Greco**, Taormina's 10,000-seat ancient Greek amphitheatre, the view of Mount Etna and the sea beyond is absolutely superb.

Alghero

The main highlights of Alghero, other than the city's ancient defenses, are the impressive domed cathedral, two dazzling palaces and a string of restaurants, shops and bars along via Roma, via Carlo Alnerto and Principe Umberto.

January/February/March

Almond Blossom Festival - Agrigento, Sicily

Having begun as a simple harvest festival, the Almond Blossom Festival moved to the spectacular Roman site near Agrigento, the Valle dei Templi, to become an international festival of folklore. The event begins with a spectacular performance by children from around the world, and continues with a programme in various indoor and outdoor venues of music and dance, in regional folkloric costumes. Entertainment is by groups from Sicily and other parts of Italy in lovely surroundings, enhanced by abundant almond blossom and atmospheric lighting among the ruins. There is a torch-lit friendship procession, and messages of worldly brotherhood are communicated via the Children's International Festival of Folklore.

April/May/June

Medieval Easter Celebrations - Assisi, Umbria

Solemn religious processions are held in many towns on the Friday or Saturday before Easter and sometimes on Easter Sunday. Many churches have special statues of the Virgin and Jesus that play a big part in the processions. The statues may be paraded through the city or displayed in the main square. Parade participants are often dressed in traditional ancient costumes.

July/August/September

Palio di Siena - Siena, Tuscany World-Famous Palio (Horse race)

Few events combine the sacred and profane to such dramatic effect as at the Corsa di Palio festival in Siena, Italy. In a horserace dedicated to the Virgin Mary, jockeys riding bareback use a whip made from the phallus of a calf to whack their opponents into submission and their horses to victory. The Italians of Tuscany call a nail without a head a "Siense nail" for a reason -- the Sienese have a reputation for losing their heads.

October/November/December

 $\ensuremath{\textbf{Wine Festival}}$ – Marino, Latium Wine-pouring fountains and lots of wine from the Roman Castles Area.
